

Sixty years ago last month, the United States exploded atomic bombs over Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The unprecedented destruction of human life changed not only the course of the war but the nature of international relations.

The testing of atomic weapons had a much less publicized effect on thousands of U.S. military personnel who until recently were sworn to secrecy about their involvement in maneuvers that left them with life-threatening illnesses. These men and women – atomic veterans – are waging a battle to gain recognition for their sacrificial service and medical attention for the diseases that now threaten their lives.

When James R. Taylor turned 17, he quit school, left his Hamilton County home and joined the United States Navy. It was 1957, and Taylor thought he could kill two birds with one stone: serve his country and get his diploma at the same time.

Although he did not see action while in the service, Taylor is facing a very real battle today. Diagnosed in 2000 with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, Taylor is fighting for his own life and for thousands of other military men and women exposed to ionizing radiation in the course of duty.

"I was a boilerman on the **USS Magoffin** for

two years," Taylor said. "We were in the South Pacific Atomic Proving Ground, and our mission was to be prepared to move troops out of the area in the event of an accident. We never had to do that.

Taylor said the men onboard the ship talked about their own risk, and that some expressed concern about being used as "guinea pigs"

"We were sworn to secrecy, something we took very seriously, so we couldn't ask anyone about potential health hazards" he said, "I knew it was just a matter of time."

When Taylor was discharged, he proceeded to pursue his dream of the good life.

He met his wife, Betty Jo, while working at his first job after his discharge as a mechanic for John Deere. The two were married in 1963 and had three daughters. All three daughters, Laura Porter Lawrence, Bobbi Joe Denmark, and Lancy Henson - live in Jacksonville along with Taylor's six grandchildren.

Taylor took advantage of the G.I. Bill to go to college, graduation from the Florida Technical College in Jacksonville in 1966. He owned a consulting business when he experienced his first encounter with cancer in 1990. He was diagnosed with prostate cancer.

Now a major part of his time is devoted to helping other atomic veterans – those who, like Taylor himself, were exposed to ionizing radiation during their military service – file claims for service-connected disabilities. Taylor is the Northeast Florida area commander of the National Association of Atomic Veterans, an organization established in 1979 to give veterans a voice and assist them in dealing with the Department of Defense and the Department of Veterans Affairs. I had prostate cancer, and I was just 50 years old," Taylor said. "My youngest daughter had just turned 13, and I prayed God would let me live to see her graduate from high school."

Taylor survived prostate cancer.

Then in 2000, Taylor was shaving and felt a knot in his neck.

"The doctors were surprised I had found the knot," he said. "When they did the biopsy, they said it was lymphoma."

Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma is on the list of diseases the U.S. Department of Defense considers "presumptive", that is presume to be associated with exposure to ionizing radiation.

The classification of service-connected diseases was just the first hurdle veterans had to face in the effort to gain medical benefits. For purposes of benefits, 21 illnesses have been determined to connected to a veteran's disability.

R.J. Ritter, the NAAV national commander estimates more than one million U.S. military veter-

ans may be suffering from the long-term effects of ionizing radiation. But getting help has been slow.

"Only 50 of approximately 280,000 claims submitted for service-connected radiation-induced illnesses were approved by the current system," Ritter told atomic veterans gathered in Tampa last month. "In fact, after being exposed to the complexities of the system, I am utterly amazed that 50 of these claims actually made it through the maze of theoretical assumptions and radiation-exposure projection models.

The second and more difficult hurdle atomic veterans had to surmount turned out to be documenting this exposure.

"One of the primary purposes of our organization {NAAV} was to help veterans who could not document their exposure to radiation," said Felton Bowden, another Jacksonville resident and member of NAAV.

Bowden served in the U.S. Air Force and was stationed at Eniwetok Island in the Bikini atoll during the 1950's. His unit was involved in Operation Greenhouse preparing the island for testing.

"We wore film badges," Bowden said, "but for many veterans, getting their records has been impossible. Records were lost or destroyed."

Bowden has been able to share the information he has uncovered and to give other veterans the benefit of what he has learned about tracking down records through NAAV.

For those without documentation, the government has developed a formula for estimating their exposure. Called dose reconstruction, this procedure has cost atomic veterans years of benefits and medical attention.

"Dose reconstruction is a catch-22 situation," Ritter said. "It denies atomic veterans access to a realistic and believable service-connected compensation process."

Taylor has been waiting since September 2003 for the government to calculate his exposure.

"Waiting is hard", said Taylor's wife Betty Jo. "You have to fill out paper work, then wait and wait. The dose reconstruction seems to be the hold-up." Betty Jo did not learn of Taylor's exposure until he was diagnosed with lymphoma. "Until the secretary [Defense Secretary William Perry] lifted the ban on what the men could talk about, I never knew anything about him being in a nuclear test sites," she said. "The Lord teaches us in all things to give thanks. That's easy when all things were good, but when things are bad it gets hard to give thanks. I always ask the lord to help us help us through each day and thank him for it - even when it's not what I want to deal with".

Securing survivor benefits for his wife and the spouses of other veterans is another major focus of Taylor and NAAV.

I would urge other veterans to go to a Veterans Affairs service office even if they don't have any symptoms or diagnosis yet", Taylor said. They need to start the process as soon as possible."

Beyond issues of compensation, NAAV's Ritter is seeking acknowledgement for atomic veterans from the country they served.

"America's sick and aging atomic veterans continue to waste away from radiation-induced illnesses, [while] consultants continue to generate theoretical opinions and hypothetical scenarios that deny atomic veterans their fully earned recognition and benefits." Ritter said. "America's atomic veterans deserve to display the Badge of Courage they so nobly earned for standing the harm's way in the face of an invisible enemy while performing their sworn duty to protect the national security and to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States.

He was born on April 6, 1937 in Kewaskum, the son of the late John and Lorinda (Schaefer) Tessar, and on March 4, 1983, he was united in marriage to Donna Zanow at St. John Lutheran Church in New Fane. Tom proudly served his country in the U. S. Navy on the USS Magoffin and was a member of the USS Magoffin Association. 
